No working group yet identified-still making information presentations that was confirmed by the power point I sent to Glenn. Etcetera, etc., and so on.

Gentlemen, Having attended a number of meetings and researched issues involving elk brucellosis, I have been keeping an eye out, and hoping to hear from Glenn Hockett about the local working groups that would be developed, as GWA has officially requested. This is a Public Trust issue and as a member of the public, as well as a sportsperson (hoping the rotator cuff will be strong enough for a hunt this year), member of Gallatin Wildlife Association and Montana Wildlife Federation, as well as a wildlife advocate, I am a Montana stakeholder in a variety of ways.

I looked forward to the meeting, we were originally invited to by Lou Goosey, only to be told that it was a private meeting and we were not allowed, unless we purchased a membership. According to a number of statements from FWP personnel concerning past events, if FWP is represented in an official capacity, then it has to be open to the public. So on Monday, I had to track down the legalities, just to be able to attend this meeting. I now have a physical copy of the Montana Annotated Code 2-3-101 - 107.

At the Bison Hearing, your FWP lawyer stated that FWP followed the statues that the legislature directed y'all to follow. So holding your feet to this "statute" fire, why did FWP employee Quentin Kujala (emailed to mt.gov address) not only sidestep the issue of his presentation and presence constituting a public meeting, but when Glenn Hockett, in an official capacity, as the president of the Gallatin Wildlife Association, requested clarification, Quentin Kujala replied, "Glen-My understanding is this is Livingston Rod and Gun Club meeting. That definition is theirs to make. Quentin"?

No, gentlemen, it is not Park County Rod and Gun Clubs right to determine if it is public or private meeting. That definition is determined according to Montana Annotated Code 2-3-101 - 107. How is it that FWP employee Quentin Kujala does not seem to understand this? In fact, according to the statue, he is not only required to understand the difference and uphold this statue, but according to the Montana Annotated Code 2-3-102, he is required in the "permitting and encouraging the public to participate in agency decisions that are of

significant interest to the public". He did not permit us, nor encourage us in attending this meeting, but in fact, obstructed us from attending.

I called Quentin at 1:29 on Monday, to discuss this statue with him, yet did not receive a call back. Suspecting I would not receive a call back and time was slipping away, at 2:34 called Pat Flowers, the Region 3 supervisor, who confirmed that the presentation portion of the meeting was open to the public and said he would speak with Quentin Kujala. No call or email was still forthcoming after that time, to confirm that all parties understood the Montana statue, that while FWP was there, that portion was open to the public. So I drove to Livingston's Park County Rod and Gun Club from Bozeman, with my printed copy of the Montana Annotated Code, hopefully assuring my public right to attend.

None of this should have been necessary. Pat Flowers clearly understands the statute, as does Tamara of Region 3 who answered the phone and professionally provided me with the statute numbers and information. So again, I ask the pertinent question - why did Quentin Kujala not "permit and encourage the public to participate", instead chose to violate the statue and obstruct our attendance? This action has caused us to not only question Quentin Kujala's competence in this matter, but the bigger picture of the FWP's Elk Brucellosis Working Groups agenda with the local working groups. Don't even get me started on the presentation and the unbelievable plethora of "um's", skipping over of the science or the irresponsible use of it. To say that I am pissed would be an understatement. As FWP employees, y'all have the privilege of upholding this Public Trust. At this juncture, as a member of the "public", I feel that this has been violated and am currently determining what I need to do about this, to ensure that it does not happen again, or to anyone else.
